⁸ **But Daniel resolved** that he would not defile himself with the king's food, or with the wine that he drank. Therefore he asked the chief of the eunuchs to allow him not to defile himself. ⁹ **And God gave Daniel** favor and compassion in the sight of the chief of the eunuchs (Daniel 1:8–9).

¹⁷ Then Daniel went to his house and made the matter known to Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah, his companions, ¹⁸ and told them to seek mercy from the God of heaven concerning this mystery, **so that Daniel and his companions might not be destroyed with the rest of the wise men of Babylon** (Daniel 2:17–18).

C. What would be the <u>loving</u> thing to do? Daniel answered the king and said, "No wise men, enchanters, magicians, or astrologers can show to the king the mystery that the king has asked (Daniel 2:27).

D. What would be the <u>right</u> thing to do?

but there is a God in heaven who reveals mysteries, and he has made known to King Nebuchadnezzar what will be in the latter days. Your dream and the visions of your head as you lay in bed are these (Daniel 2:28).

- E. What would be the <u>wise</u> thing to do?
 ⁴⁸ Then the king gave Daniel high honors and many great gifts, and made him ruler over the whole province of Babylon and chief prefect over all the wise men of Babylon. ⁴⁹ Daniel made a request of the king, and he appointed Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego over the affairs of the province of Babylon. But Daniel remained at the king's court (Daniel 2:48–49).

 - A. Make <u>space</u> for people who don't <u>agree</u>.

⁴⁹ John answered, "Master, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because **he does not follow with us**." ⁵⁰ But Jesus said to him, "Do not stop him, for the one who is not against you is for you." (Luke 9:49–50).

True tolerance is an ability to acknowledge and permit other people's views. To put up with opinions with which you don't agree. To live with ideas and people you find appalling. True tolerance— some call it "principled pluralism" is a fundamental feature of a truly free society. NOTE: There is a new definition of tolerance. Let's call it "fake tolerance." Fake tolerance has emerged over the last decade. It goes something like this: "We will tolerate you as long as your opinion falls within the range of what we deem acceptable." (We need to listen more and talk less.)
