Navigating Cultural Currents April 23, 2017

<u>Introduction</u>: Of all the topics in our cultural series, I would say the topic of modesty hits seriously close to home. Let me say this upfront: beauty is not a sin. What is sinful, shameful and ultimately degrading is when we take the treasures God has given us and display them openly for those who don't have a right to taste, touch, feel and experience those treasures. Today we head into deep water on the topic of modesty.

Scripture Reading: 1 Corinthians 6:19-20

- I. Responding to Today's Culture
 - A. Make space for others who don't share your convictions.

⁴⁹ John answered, "Master, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because **he does not follow with us**." ⁵⁰ But Jesus said to him, "Do not stop him, for the one who is not against you is for you" (Luke 9:49–50).

Tolerance – The ability to acknowledge and permit other people's views. To put up with opinions with which you disagree. To live with ideas and people you may find appalling.

Fake Tolerance – Tolerating other people's views as long as their opinion falls within your range of acceptability.

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Principle: We need to listen more, condemn less.

- B. Live out your <u>convictions</u> and stand out in a <u>crowd</u>.

 But Peter and the apostles answered, "We must obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29).

- III. Modesty 2 Kings 20 Hezekiah
 - A. To have regard for decency of behavior, speech, or dress.
 - B. Whether we like it or not, we live in a culture where <u>immodesty</u> is a serious <u>problem</u>. Were they ashamed when they committed abomination? No, they were not at all ashamed; **they did not know how to blush** (Jeremiah 6:15a).

NOTE: We all would agree there is an <u>absolute norm</u> to be kept when it comes to modesty.

NOTE: The struggle is agreeing on where that line needs to land.

IV. Modesty Principles

A. Ownership

¹⁹ Or do you not know that **your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you**, whom you have from God? **You are not your own**, ²⁰ for you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body (1 Corinthians 6:19–20).

B. Lordship

For to this end Christ died and lived again, that he might **be Lord both of the dead and of the living** (Romans 14:9).

C. Holiness

³ For this is the will of God, your sanctification: that you abstain from sexual immorality; ⁴ that **each one of you know how to control his own body in holiness and honor**, ⁵ not in the passion of lust like the Gentiles who do not know God; ⁶ that **no one transgress and wrong his brother** in this matter, because the Lord is an avenger in all these things, as we told you beforehand and solemnly warned you. ⁷ **For God has not called us for impurity, but in holiness**. ⁸ Therefore whoever disregards this, disregards not man but God, who gives his Holy Spirit to you (1 Thessalonians 4:3–8).
